<b>Arch Angel</b>	<b>6</b>	<b>15-18"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. sprengeri 'Diva' x (M. x soulangiana 'Brozzoni') with huge, heavily textured white flowers. From what I've seen, I would say that there is some pink in the flowers some years.			
<b>Atlanta</b>	<b>3</b>	<b>24-30"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. grandiflora with light green, narrow leaves and tan indumentum.			
<b>Brozzoni</b>	<b>5</b>	<b>18-30"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
White flowered soulangiana with rose colored veins. Flowers to 10".			
<b>Butterflies</b>	<b>10</b>	<b>18-24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. acuminata 'Fertile Myrtle' x M. denudata 'Sawada's Cream' PP#7456 . Bright yellow flowers with red stamens. An excellent plant from Phil Savage. (\$1 patent fee added).			
<b>Cairn Croft (thompsoniana)</b>	<b>3</b>	<b>8"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
This new selection of M. thompsoniana was sent to me by Dr. Peter Del Tredici from the Arnold Arboretum. If memory serves me, Peter said that it is more densely branched than typical thompsoniana. All M. thompsoniana selections are good in my book and I'm excited to have a new one for the collection!			
<b>Candy Cane</b>	<b>4</b>	<b>15-18"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
A Gresham hybrid with rose colored flower fading to white at the tips and a deep rose stripe in the center of each tepal.			
<b>Carlos</b>	<b>5</b>	<b>6-8"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. acuminata var. subcordata x M. denudata. Pale yellow flowers with a greenish flushed base. Rarely ever offered in the trade. Named and released by Philippe de Spoelberch in Belgium.			
<b>Chang Hua (Chamelion)</b>	<b>1</b>	<b>24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
Very little information available on this. A cultivar of M. amoena.			
<b>Charles Coates</b>	<b>2</b>	<b>24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. tripetala x M. sieboldii. A fantastic hybrid with large, fragrant white flowers with reddish stamens. Large leaves give the plant a tropical appearance during the summer. Grows as a large shrub. One of my favorite summer flowering trees!			
<b>Coates</b>	<b>8</b>	<b>10-24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. x soulangiana with small (for a M x soul.), dark purple flowers. My favorite M. x soulangiana due to the large number of flowers produced and that it blooms about two weeks later than other M. x soulangiana cultivars. Typically avoids our late frosts here..			
<b>Colossus</b>	<b>15</b>	<b>24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. sieboldii from the late August Kehr's breeding program. Reportedly a hexaploid (there seems to be some question as to the validity of this) with much larger than normal leaves and flowers. Flowers are white with red stamens and can vary from year to year (even branch to branch!) from single, semi-double to fully double flowers. Blooms off and on through most of the summer and sometimes into the fall. This is the ONLY M. sieboldii that I can grow here in our hot climate - great for both warm and cold climates!

<b>Copper Top</b>	12	24-60"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with tan indumentum and reportedly copper new growth. Very fast grower. Rarely ever offered.			
<b>Coral Reef</b>	1	8"	\$50.00
I can't find any information on this one. I assume it has coral colored flowers. Any information would be greatly appreciated!			
<b>Crimson Stipple</b>	7	12-15"	\$50.00
Gresham hybrid with large, fragrant, white to pale pink flowers with crimson stippling on outside of tepals.			
<b>Donna</b>	5	18-24"	\$50.00
M. kobus var. loebneri with VERY LARGE (8") flowers. This is the CORRECT Donna. I have a very large collection of M. loebneri and this is by far the largest flowered selection that I have ever seen! FANTASTIC!!!			
<b>Dr. Henry Orr</b>	1	18"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with broadly conical growth habit. No more information on this one! Rare in collections.			
<b>Elisa Odenwald</b>	3	18-24"	\$50.00
Gresham hybrid with large, fragrant, white flowers with dark pink blush at base of tepals. Seems to be slightly later blooming than many other Greshams and has been a long time favorite at the J. C. Raulston Arboretum in Raleigh, North Carolina.			
<b>Elmiria</b>	5	12-18"	\$50.00
This was sent to me as the sister seedling to Eva Maria (M. x brooklynensis) and is reported to have larger flowers that hang down some. From photos I've seen, I would say it is very similar to Eva Maria in color. I've never seen this one offered before!			
<b>Emory</b>	1	12"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with a very columnar growth habit. The original tree was 8-90 feet tall by 12 feet wide. Brown indumentum on bottom side of leaf.			
<b>Eva Maria</b>	5	15-24"	\$50.00
M. x brooklynensis hybrid with very unusual colored buds and flowers! Buds are purple with green and yellow shades and flowers open to be magenta-rose blushed with orange and yellow! WILD!!! Much nicer than it actually sounds.			
<b>Fei Huang (Yellow River)</b>	2	24-30"	\$50.00
M. denudata with pale yellow flowers similar to 'Elizabeth in size and color. Reportedly NOT a hybrid, but a color variant of M. denudata. EXCELLENT plant!			
<b>Ferruginea</b>	3	24-36"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with very bright orange/bronze indumentum. Bright green, fairly narrow leaves.			
<b>Firefly</b>	2	12-24"	\$50.00
M. x soulangiana with goblet shaped, fragrant ruby colored flowers.			
<b>Flamingo</b>	4	12-18"	\$50.00
M. acuminata 'Fertile Myrtle' x M. sprengeri 'Diva'. Pyramidal growth habit. Flamingo pink flowers that open just before the leaves. EXTREMELY cold hard!			
<b>Foothills</b>	7	36"+	\$50.00
M. grandiflora. This is reportedly the most COLD HARDY selection there is. The original plant was growing about 100 miles North of Chicago (zone 4b)! Unfortunately, the owners cut the tree down (they thought it was a Rhododendron) since it didn't produce purple flowers!!! EXTREMELY RARE!!!

<b>Frank's Masterpiece</b>	<b>10</b>	<b>10-12"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>(M. x soulangiana 'Deep Purple Dream') x (x 'Paul Cook'). This Frank Galyon hybrid has a fairly strong central leader and semi-pendulous branches. Deep reddish-purple flowers are 10-11" across. Rarely offered and always huge demand for this one. Please order quickly to insure getting one of these beauties!</p>			
<b>Green Mist</b>	<b>7</b>	<b>12-24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. x loebneri. Sorry, I can find no other information on this one except that it was released from Duncan and Davies in New Zealand.</p>			
<b>Hattie Carthan</b>	<b>5</b>	<b>12-18"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. x brooklynensis hybrid with yellow flowers and purplish stipe through the middle of each tepal. Outer tepals have a greenish blush. Very unusual and seldom offered.</p>			
<b>Hillcrest Selection</b>	<b>2</b>	<b>18-36"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. grandiflora. Large growing tree with light brown indumentum and is very cold hardy. This was selected in a zone 5 climate I believe. Excellent landscape plant are rarely seen in collections.</p>			
<b>Honey Glow</b>	<b>1</b>	<b>18"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>I can't find any information on this one. I do know it is a yellow flowered magnolia.</p>			
<b>Honey Liz</b>	<b>8</b>	<b>10-15"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. acuminata var. subcordata 'Miss Honeybee' x (M. x 'Elisabeth') with large, floppy yellow flowers. I bloomed this for the first time this year and was blown away by the quality and color of the flower. One of the BEST yellow flowered magnolias I've ever seen (and I've seen a lot!).</p>			
<b>Illini Gold</b>	<b>4</b>	<b>8-12"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>NEW RELEASE! Not much information on this one I'm afraid. Yellow flowers. I have not yet bloomed this cultivar - scion wood was just sent in this past season. NEVER before offered and extremely limited.</p>			
<b>Illini Moonlight</b>	<b>3</b>	<b>10-15"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>

<p>M. grandiflora with reportedly exceptional flowers. I have not yet seen it bloom (my stock plants get cut back hard every year so I rarely see flowers on M. grandiflora. Rare in collections.</p>			
<b>Judy Zuk</b>	<b>3</b>	<b>12-18"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. x brooklynensis hybrid with yellow flowers and a plum colored flush at the base of the tepals and reportedly has the fragrance of fruit loops cereal! A couple of years ago, the Magnolia Society Internation was touring Scott Arboretum in Philadelphia and everyone that saw this plant wanted one. Sorry to say, but we only have 3 available. Sure to sell out within the first hour of updating the website. ORDER QUICKLY!</p>			
<b>Kay Parris</b>	<b>20</b>	<b>12-15"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. grandiflora with MANY exceptional traits! This is a seedling from Little Gem and most likely the father was Bracken's Brown Beauty. It has FANTASTIC, bright, extremely glossy green leaves with very brilliant orange-rust indumentum. The leaf margins are very undulating and add a very unique feature to this plant. Flowers are fairly small (6-8") but are produced in large numbers over a long period of time. I have ~120 cultivars of M. grandiflora in my collection and this is by far my favorite!!! Sure to become the most popular magnolia of all time!</p>			
<b>Kewensis</b>	<b>7</b>	<b>30-60"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
<p>M. kobus x M. salicifolia. White flowers are very much like typical M. salicifolia. Extremely strong growing. New growth has a beautiful purple flush. Makes a very nice plant very quickly. One of my favorites! (OK, I KNOW, I really DO have a lot of favorites!)</p>

<p>M. acuminata x M. denudata. This Leach hybrid has pale yellow flowers that are produced in large numbers.</p>

<b>Lilliputian</b>	<b>3</b>	<b>8-10"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. x soulangiana. This is the smallest growing of the x soulangiana and will make a medium sized shrub or small tree. Flowers are fairly small and are white tinged pink. Flowers are produced in tremendous numbers over a fairly long time period.			
<b>Lois</b>	<b>2</b>	<b>8"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. acuminata x (M. acuminata x M. denudata). This hybrid is similar to 'Elizabeth' but has deeper yellow flowers and starts to bloom as 'Elizabeth' is finishing. Fairly new, and not commonly available yet.			
<b>M. nitida var. lotungensis</b>	<b>2</b>	<b>10-15"</b>	<b>\$80.00</b>
M. nitida var. lotungensis or M. lotungensis (I'm very confused yet on this one!) In my mind, the very best of the evergreen magnolias!!! Very narrow growth habit with small, EXTREMELY glossy leaves. Completely cold hardy here to a few degrees below zero f. To my knowledge, this species has not yet bloomed in the USA, but will have small, cream colored flowers. Unfortunately, very difficult to propagate and is therefore rather expensive. Certainly worth trying into zone 6. EXTREMELY LIMITED - order quickly!			
<b>Magnolia fordiana ssp. Yuyuensis (known in the trade as</b>	<b>1</b>	<b>10"</b>	<b>\$75.00</b>
This truly must be one of the most beautiful evergreen trees in the World! Very long, narrow, glossy evergreen leaves and a strongly pyramidal growth habit. Even without flowers, this tree is the nicest tree we have in the garden. Our original tree took ~14 years from seed to flower (can take up to 20 years). Flowers are white with bright reddish pink stamens (looks like M. sieboldii) and face upwards. Blooms for about 3 weeks. This plant is a graft from my blooming aged tree. EXTREMELY difficult to propagate!!!			
<b>March Till Frost</b>	<b>10</b>	<b>24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
(M. liliiflora x M. cylindrica) x M. 'Ruby'. Dark purple flowers that continue to be produced throughout the growing season. Interesting, upright growth habit. Seed cones stand upright and look like candle flames. ALWAYS in short supply and rarely available. This is the first I've had available in the past several years. Order quickly since they will not last!!! An excellent Kehr hybrid!			
<b>McCracken's Bronze Leaf</b>	<b>12</b>	<b>18-40"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. grandiflora with extremely dark green leaves, rich bronze/orange indumentum and the new growth comes out a deep purplish bronze most years. This is my own selection and had NEVER before been released. Makes a beautiful, large tree.			
<b>Minnie Mouse</b>	<b>8</b>	<b>8-10"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. liliiflora with small, dark wine red flowers on an EXTREMELY dwarf plant. Leaves are also very small. I've seen plants that were ten years old and maybe 3 feet tall. This plant has been in huge demand from me and rarely available. FINALLY I have enough stock to release a few plants. Sure to sell out very quickly!			
<b>Miranja</b>	<b>4</b>	<b>10-15"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
Reportedly M. acuminata 'Busey x M. acuminata var. subcordata 'Miss Honey', but has PINK flowers! So where did pink flowers come from in this cross? I've seen the original tree in Belgium and was impressed with the overall quality of the plant. Certainly EXTREMELY rare in the USA - these are likely the only ones available.			
<b>Miss Honeybee</b>	<b>1</b>	<b>8"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. acuminata var. subcordata. Yellow flowers that are larger than the species. Reportedly produced in larger numbers than the species as well.			
<b>NCSU Variegated (virginiana)</b>	<b>1</b>	<b>30"</b>	<b>\$100.00</b>
M. virginiana with unstable cream mottling on the very large leaves. Deciduous. What impresses me the most about this plant (other than the striking foliage) are the HUGE flowers (up to nearly 7 inches across!). Difficult to propagate so fairly expensive. VERY RARE!!!			
<b>O'Neill</b>	<b>5</b>	<b>15-24"</b>	<b>\$50.00</b>
M. liliiflora with dark, wine red flowers that are similar to 'Nigra' but slightly larger and darker and blooms later in the season.

<b>Pegasus</b>	8	12-24"	\$50.00
M. cylindrica with creamy white flowers produced in enormous numbers! I've seen a plant in the UK that had so many flowers on it that you literally could not see the branches! This cultivar has produced some outstanding hybrids as well. Fairly slow growing and doesn't seem to make a very large plant. A truly FANTASTIC plant!			
<b>Peter Smithers</b>	2	24-36"	\$50.00
Gresham hybrid with large, dark rose colored flowers and reddish stamens as well. A large tree in bloom will stop traffic! A beautiful plant!			
<b>Phil Savage</b>	11	12-24"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with very little tan indumentum on the bottom side of the leaves. EXTREMELY cold hardy (reportedly). May be OK into zone 5. Rarely ever offered and has been in high demand - order quickly!			
<b>Pink Delight</b>	4	8-12"	\$50.00
(M. x soulangiana 'Alexandrina') x (M. x 'Galaxy') with extremely fragrant pink flowers. Reported to be extremely fertile as both seed and pollen parent so would be very useful to future plant breeding.			
<b>Pink Surprise</b>	2	8"	\$50.00
(M. liliiflora x M. sprengeri 'Diva') x ((M. acuminata x M. x soulangiana 'Picture')) with large, bright pink flowers. Secondary blooms extend the bloom time for up to a month.			
<b>Plena</b>	3	24-36"	\$50.00
M. virginiana with semi-double flowers. Seems to vary from year to year and is more double some years.			
<b>Porclean Dove</b>	2	18-30"	\$50.00
M. globosa x M. virginiana. This Todd Gresham hybrid has 4", fragrant, white flowers with red stamens and blooms throughout the summer.			
<b>R10-24</b>	6	24-48"	\$50.00
M. sieboldii 'Genesis' x M. virginiana. This August Kehr hybrid is very similar to 'Porclean Dove' but has a faster growth rate and appears to be more heat adapted. Flowers can be 6" and are white with red stamens.			
<b>R15-6 virgiana x Pink Manglietia</b>	1	???	\$150.00
This one is truly for the collector of weird magnolias! August Kehr produced this hybrid and used M. virginiana as the seed parent and pollen that was sent to him from China of a pink flowered Manglietia (this is now Magnolia). The plant finally has bloomed and certainly surprised me! Flowers are small and have the appearance of M. virginiana flowers, BUT they are soft yellow!!! My guess is that the Chinese sent over a yellow flowering Manglietia accidentally. Anyway, we will never know for sure what this is, but a one of a kind plant! I only have one plant available and it is sure to go fast. Difficult to propagate.			
<b>Raspberry Fun</b>	5	15-30"	\$50.00
M. x loebneri 'Leonard Messel' open pollinated. Similar to 'Leonard Messel' but with wider tepals that are darker pink colored and also pink on the insides of the tepals. Flowers are produced in clusters of 2-3. A great plant that is rarely offered.			
<b>Red Barron</b>	8	10-15"	\$50.00
M. acuminata x (M. x 'Big Dude'). Flowers similar to 'Big Dude' but darker red. Very cold hardy.			
<b>Rosemoor</b>	5	30-36"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with compact growth habit and reportedly flowers at a young age. Leaves are dark green and have brown indumentum. This cultivar was selected at Rosemoor Garden in Devon, England.			
<b>Rubra</b>	3	12-24"	\$50.00
M. stellata selection with darker pink flowers than 'Rosea'. I have been very impressed by the flower display of this plant!

<b>Samuel Sommers</b>	1	20"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with large, dark green, very glossy leaves. Flowers are larger than the species and are followed by bright pink "cones"! Makes a large tree and is one of my favorite large magnolias.			
<b>Satin Leaf</b>	2	12-18"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with dark brown indumentum. Would be useful as a cut foliage plant!			
<b>Sayonnara</b>	1	10"	\$50.00
Gresham hybrid with huge, pure white flowers with a soft pink blush at base of tepals. Very late blooming for a Gresham.			
<b>sieboldii x 'Sweet Summer'</b>	7	10-18"	\$100.00
This is one of the most unusual crosses ever done! M. sieboldii (tetraploid form) x (M. virginiana x M. grandiflora 'Samuel Sommers'). This plant was hybridized by Frank Galyon and has yet to bloom. Most people would not realize that this isn't a M. grandiflora since it has large, evergreen leaves (totally amazing since the mother is deciduous!!!). The largest plant (over 15 feet tall) is at Plant Delight's Nursery, in Raleigh, North Carolina - we keep looking every year to see if it will flower. We are HOPING for large white flowers with red stamens and the fragrance of M. virginiana on an evergreen tree - WOW!!! I've only offered this once or twice before and will likely not produce it again for several more years. It is rather difficult to propagate so due to this and it's extreme RARITY, the price is rather high. This is potentially one of the very best magnolias that has ever been developed!			
<b>Slankard</b>	1	36"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora. Sorry, I don't have any information on this one either. Named by George Slankard in Illinois, so must be very cold hardy!			
<b>Star Wars</b>	10	24-36"	\$50.00
M. campbellii x M. liliiflora. This Blumhardt hybrid has bright pink, 10" flowers. Much more cold hardy than M. campbellii (we can grow 'Starwars' here with no problem). EXTREMELY fast growing (our fastest magnolia by far). A FANTASTIC tree!			
<b>Suishoren</b>	3	24-30"	\$50.00
A bit of a mystery on this cultivar. There are two very different descriptions of this plant. One states that it is a pink M. x soulangiana and the other that it is likely a hybrid of M. kobus or M. cylindrica and M. denudata and has white flowers. From what I have seen, I would say the latter statement is correct, BUT I'm not certain where I received this scionwood, SO it could be either! I'm 99% certain that it is the white flowered form and if so, this is the BEST that I have seen. Totally SMOTHERED with flowers!			
<b>Sun Sprite</b>	10	15-18"	\$50.00
An unregistered (and not officially named) selection from the late August Kehr. This is a sister seedling to his famous 'Sunspire' and has the same extremely narrow growth habit but is MUCH slower growing. At 15 years old, the original plant is not much more than 12 feet tall and about a foot wide!!! Deep golden yellow flowers with strong purple flush at base of tepals. EXTREMELY late blooming. VERY RARE and would work in even the narrowest space in your garden! Very limited.			
<b>Sunsation</b>	15	8-10"	\$50.00
An August Kehr hybrid with very large, golden yellow flowers with a purple blush at the base of the tepals. Flower color can vary from year to year (in warm spring temperatures, the flower color is paler yellow and more purple showing). Extremely heavy blooming and typically will bloom the first year from grafting (this is a very rare trait in yellow flowering magnolias). Growth habit is densely pyramidal (could be used in a formal garden!). VERY late blooming - one of the very latest of all spring flowering magnolias that we have, so late frosts are rarely an issue with this great plant!			
<b>Taylor's Willowleaf</b>	6	18-24"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora selected by Jose Martinez at Taylor's Nursery, Raleigh, NC several years ago. The leaves are very long and narrow (they don't look like magnolia leaves!) and the plant forms a very tight, compact ball. The original plant is ~12 years old and ~6 feet x 6 feet. NEVER before offered! A true dwarf for the smaller garden. Flowers are small and don't appear to be produced in large numbers (at least not yet).

<b>thompsoniana</b>	2	12-15"	\$50.00
M. virginiana x M. tripetala. Flowers are similar to M. virginiana in fragrance and form, but are much larger. Leaves are very large and have an almost tropical appearance. One of my favorite summer flowering magnolias for foliage and fragrance!			
<b>Topaz</b>	1	18"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora with dark green leaves with slight brown indumentum. Very stocky looking plant. RARE!			
<b>Treyvei</b>	4	18-30"	\$50.00
M. grandiflora selection from France that is reportedly very floriferous and cold hardy.			
<b>Two Stones</b>	4	12-15"	\$50.00
M. kobus. This tetraploid was produced by August Kehr and is like a kobus but with all parts larger. Fast growing and will produce a perfectly shaped tree. The strange name came about accidentally. When August Kehr first noticed this tree in his field, he wanted to mark it for future evaluation. At the time, he didn't have anything with him to mark the tree with, so he picked up two stones from the field and put them beside the tree. Not much of a name to be sure, but an interesting story of how names can come about! My favorite, white flowering M. kobus. FANTASTIC tree!!!			
<b>Upright denudata</b>	8	18-30"	\$50.00
NEW RELEASE! A fantastic new selection from the Scott Arboretum in Philadelphia with typical white flowers and a very narrow grow habit. The original plant is a tower of white flowers in the spring. Not yet named.			
<b>Vegetable Garden</b>	5	12-15"	\$50.00
M. x loebneri with pink flowers and multiple tepals. Very slow growing. Selected by Camellia Forest Nursery in North Carolina and was named for the location in the garden! Rarely offered and unfortunately, I believe that the original tree has been lost.			
<b>White Elegance</b>	6	12-24"	\$50.00
No information on this one at all. If anyone can help with this, please contact me. From the name, I would guess white, elegant flowers! How is that for a description!

This truly must be one of the greatest redbuds ever! The growth habit is compact (like Avondale) and it produces MOUNTAINS of the typical redbud colored flowers in the spring. Truly a FANTASTIC plant!!!
